   government's flagship international
   educational and cultural exchange
   program.

   Department of State with funding provided by the U.S. Government and administered by the Institute of International Education.

# Eligibility for U.S. Scholar Program



- U.S. citizenship
- Degree and experience, as required by award:
  - Ph.D. or other terminal degree
  - MA and higher education teaching or professional experience
  - Professional and/or artistic experience with substantial accomplishments
  - Teaching experience
- Compliance with <u>policies</u> on previous Fulbright Scholar awards and waiting periods between grants






## Distribution of Opportunities 2022-2023

Fulbright awards allow academics and professionals to participate in a wide variety of activities:

- Scholar Awards (85%) (any range of experience)
- Postdoctoral Awards (4%) (under 7 years)
- Distinguished Scholar Awards (7%) (13+ years)
- International Education Administrator Awards (4%)

- Allows multiple visits over two years






- How does it benefit you professionally?



## Selecting the Right Award

- Match country interest, expertise, career profile, and proposal to the award description
- Language ability (if applicable)
- Discipline preferences, when specified
- Project relevance to the host country and/or institution
- Benefits to you and your community
- Maximizing success:
  - Number of opportunities?
  - Flexibility in region?
  - Flexibility in country?







## **Application Components**

### **Requirements:**

- Application Form
- Project Statement
- Curriculum Vitae or Resume
- 2 Letters of Recommendation
- Language Proficiency Report (if required)
- Letter of Invitation (if required)

### **Supplemental Materials:**

- Course outlines or syllabi (for teaching)
- Select bibliography (for research)
- Portfolio submissions (for artists, architects, and journalists)





# **Application Cycle**

FEBRUARY	Catalog of Awards Opens
SEPTEMBER 15	Application Deadline
SEPTEMBER	Program staff conducts technical reviews for completeness
OCTOBER – NOVEMBER	U.S. peer review
NOVEMBER – JANUARY	Applicants notified of status. Recommended applications are sent to host countries and to the Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board.
JANUARY – APRIL	Final decisions are made
MAY – ONWARD	Participants prepare for departure







### **UCSD Academic Leave Policy**

#### **Sabbatical Leave**

- Asst, Assoc, or full Professor
- Must have accrued appropriate service time

#### Leave with Pay in Lieu of Sabbatical

- Faculty appointments ineligible for Sabbatical (Professor in Residence, Salaried Adjunct/Clinical, Lecturer with Security of Employment)
- Will need record of past service (similar to sabbatical credits)

#### Leave from Professorial Duties to do Research

Paid from grant funding under a research title

#### Change in Work Location (not considered leave)

- Allowed for up to 60 consecutive service days
- Appointee's duties cannot be assigned to another, so will only happen during a non-teaching quarter

#### **Extended Leave Policy (with or without pay)**

- Required if duties must be reassigned
- May forfeit earning of sabbatical credits if leave with pay

#### **Leave without Pay**

- When accepting visiting appointments outside UCSD
- Benefits implications
